Maxine's Story

As Meet and Greet volunteers at the Museum, we are often told interesting family history stories from the early days of mining by our visitors.

Two weeks ago this happened to me. It involved a story about Harry Armour, who was the local blacksmith in 1912, during the strike. The visitor, who is the blacksmith's grandson, said that his grandfather was doing his job by going into the mine and shoeing the horses regardless of the strike, while continuing to run his farrier business in Kenny Street.

Many years later, when in his 80s, the blacksmith went to get into a taxi for a ride home from town and the taxi driver called him a "strike breaker". Upon which the old man got out of the taxi, and for the rest of his life refused to ever ride in a taxi again.
